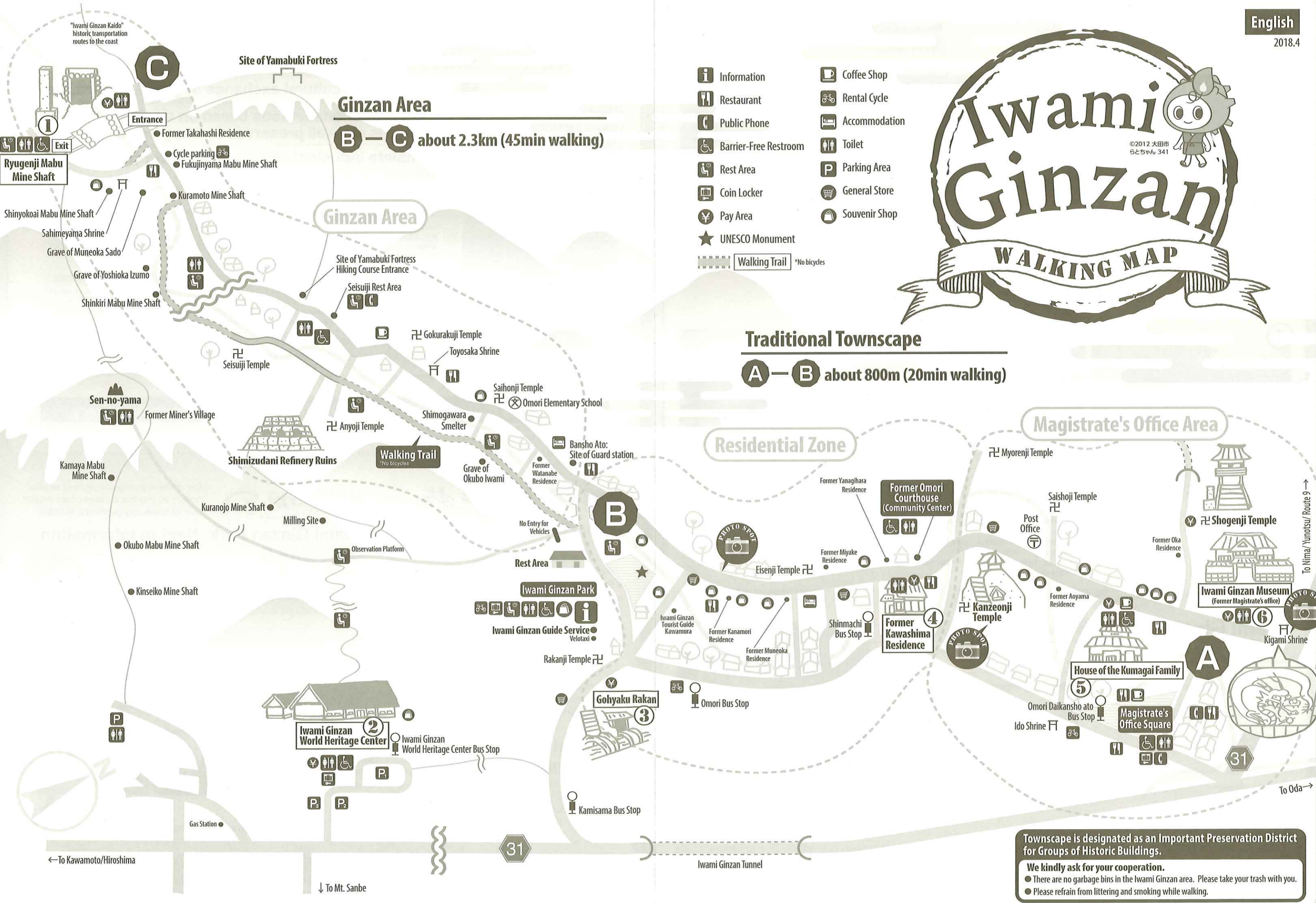

1 Ryugenji Mabu Mine Shaft

This mabu (mining tunnel) was developed in the 17th century. Chisel marks remain visible on the walls of the lengthy section that is open to the public.

2 Iwami Ginzan World Heritage Center

This facility's comprehensive displays offer an enriching orientation to the history of Iwami Ginzan and its impact on world history. Through comprehensive displays of excavated items, replica models and multimedia, visitors gain a greater appreciation and enhanced understanding of the true value of this World Heritage Site.

3 Gohyaku Rakan (Rakanji Temple)

This site, which features some picturesque stonemasonry, was built over a period of 25 years around the mid-18th century to commemorate people who died in the silver mine and to honor the spirits of ancestors.

4 Former Kawashima Residence

The Kawashima family, who had become head of Iwami Ginzan Silver Mine officials, built this house in the beginning of the 1800s. The well preserved floor plan and room arrangement exhibit the unique characteristics of a samurai residence.

5 House of the Kumagai Family

The Kumagai house provided financial services, served as a purveyor to municipal officials and the Magistrate's office and flourished as one of the most powerful merchants in town in the 19th century. The current building was rebuilt after the Great Fire of 1800. In recent years, major efforts were made in order to restore the buildings to its former glory. It features a hidden underground cellar and is a must-see.

6 Iwami Ginzan Museum (Former Magistrate's office)

Here, administrative affairs of the Tokugawa Shogunate-controlled Iwami Ginzan were conducted. Picture scrolls, historic documents, silver ingots and tools used in the silver refinery process as well as many other mining artifacts from the museum's collection are on display here.

Park & Ride

In order to provide safety, security and convenience to all visitors, a park and ride system is in effect. Outstanding Universal Value: Iwami Ginzan Silver Mine as a World Heritage Site

3 main reasons this area was designated World Heritage status

- 1 Economic and cultural exchange of global importance
- 2 Silver production methods based on traditional techniques are well preserved in many areas
- 3 A complete industrial system, from silver production to shipment, is displayed in its entirety



1. Economic and cultural exchange of global importance.

In the 16th century, the haifuki (cupellation) method of East Asian traditional metal refining was introduced to Iwami Ginzan, leading to local silver production techniques being established and large amounts of silver being produced (as much as 1/3rd of global silver production). This silver circulated throughout East Asia via trade routes during the 16th and 17th centuries.

2. Silver production methods based on traditional techniques are well preserved in many areas.

Throughout the Edo Period (1603-1867) traditional techniques were used to produce silver at Iwami Ginzan. In the end of the 19th century, new techniques were developed in Europe, however by this time the silver mines of Iwami Ginzan were depleted. As a result, traditional techniques for mining development were left unchanged and well preserved.

3. A complete industrial system, from silver production to shipment, is displayed in its entirety.

The Iwami Ginzan Silver Mine ruins present a complete system of mine management from silver production to shipment. This provides a rare example of a mine ruins united with the rich, natural surroundings, forming a holistic cultural landscape.

Velotaxi

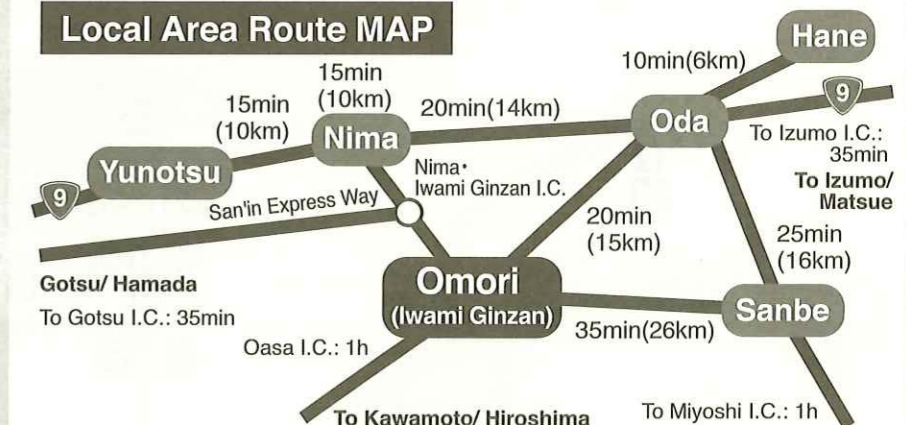
The driver is your guide (as well as your motor!) as you and a friend cruise around town at a leisurely pace on a Velotaxi.
